As this year comes to an end and the new one dawns, it is our prayer that God will continue to grant us the richest of blessings via His Son and that we can all continue to share in them as His beloved children. In our neck of the woods, the months of October and November were filled with much to be thankful for.

In my last report, I mentioned that we had been studying the book of Acts. We did an overview study that took just about 4 months covering about a chapter each time we met. It was a rewarding study. After this, we spent a couple weeks examining the texts that deal with our practice of collecting money for the local church to use in various ways. I think it's fair to say that those two weeks of studying about the collection was challenging and very beneficial and I think we all learned something to help us appreciate it even more.

Our must current class now takes us into the tragic and messy world of the Judges. As I write this, we are 2 chapters into the book and it's been a beneficial study in so many ways already. I polled our members here and everyone stated that they had never really done an in depth study of the book. Others, in their blunt honesty, stated that they tried to avoid it at all costs. Perhaps that's not such a bad thing because, in some sense, we can study with a greater sense of appreciation of a book that we really haven't unpacked and appreciated before. We are learning so much already and not a few members have stated how excited they are that we are studying it now. God is good. Please pray that our study of Judges will help us to appreciate the gravity of sin and the richness of God's mercy.

On November 13-16, we successfully held our Fall Gospel Meeting with Trevor Trokey from Rapid City, SD. Trevor presented lessons for us around the idea of commonly overlooked and least talked about sins. He did an excellent job challenging us to think more deeply about sins such as gluttony, pride, enmity, idleness and lust. We had several with us who are not yet Christians that came and many

Christians from nearby churches who visited. It was encouraging and yet admonishing to hear these lessons. More often than not, we need our toes to be stepped on so we can keep drawing closer to our holy God and these lessons accomplished much in that arena.

We are prayerful that as we get to know them better and as we seek to have more studies with Will and his family, they will learn about Jesus and His ability to save and turn to His mercies in obedience.

It has been extremely hard on her as you can imagine so recently, she decided to move here to Maryland to be with one of her sons who is not a Christian and she is now worshipping with our church family. She is settling in fairly nicely and has been an integral part of our group since coming in late October.

She is working through the pain and hurt and I am grateful that she is willing to open up about this so that she can get encouragement and good advice that will help her persevere and go through this phase. The devil is always looking for an opportunity to cause us to turn away. I am glad that she is now with us and that we can be of some small help in her walk with our Lord. Please pray for her strength, increase in faith and comfort in the mercies of our God.

Lynnora is also one of our newest additions to the group here. She is 28 and recently moved to Gaithersburg, MD from Texas where she was in college finishing up a degree. She was brought up in a kind of extremist environment. This has made her naturally more inquisitive about a lot of things which I don't think is bad.

She has had a lot of questions as she seeks to better understand her own beliefs and why she does the things that she does spiritually. This is admirable. She has chosen to forge her own spiritual identity and knows that will allow her to become stronger and more mature in the faith. She also has been seeing a young man for the last seven years who holds to some beliefs that are different than what she knows to be true. They have been talking recently about marriage and she has been contemplating what she should do.

He is not a Christian and she knows that he does not agree with some biblical principles so she is unsure whether to pursue the marriage. We talked to her recently about this and gave her some advice. She knows that they need to study more and talk more about these things before they can proceed. This is a difficult situation especially since they have been dating for such a long time. Please pray for Lynnora's walk with the Lord and pray that she will make the right decisions that will keep her on the right path.

We don't know yet what the near future holds.
